Building Secure!

City Approval

After quite a bit of preparation and explanation, the city has given its approval to our plan to add classroom space above the foyer. This huge area, originally drawn as empty space in the building plans, will come in handy for classrooms and storage area! In addition, we have city approval to build a staircase on the outside of the south wall of the building that will lead to this new classroom area. Watch for the stairs to start creeping up the wall!

Pillars of Lafayette

They may not be in the same league as the Pillars of Hercules (one of the Seven Wonders Of The World, for those of you in the Nintendo Generation), but they are thoroughly impressive. Herb Dayhoff, our stonemason, is on the job building stone columns at the corners of our new building! He carefully cuts each stone to the proper length, then chips each exposed face to produce a beautiful shadow effect that adds to the natural beauty of the rock. One column is nearly done, and we're all anxiously waiting for the mud to dry out around the building so that he can continue his work on the others.

Landscaping Committee

Please keep the Landscaping Committee in your prayers in the weeks to come! We're fast approaching the time when decisions have to be made and work begun on the land around the new building; we need to start on parking lots, exterior lighting, and the whole stack of issues associated with the building's exterior. This effort is a whole lot more complicated than it looks; there are hundreds of tasks to be planned out, scheduled, and executed in the proper sequence. Lift up Glen Degenhart and the Landscaping Committee in your prayer time; they need our support and God's leadership as they roll up their sleeves and start to work.
